Dear Paul:

I talked with the Taylor's last week regarding moving many of the items from their home. The consensus was that for a variety of reasons the Taylor's are having a difficult time deciding what to move from their home, and what to just scrap, as continued exposure to the toxic fumes in their home will ruin, or already has ruined, many items.

For example, mattresses are permeated with gasoline fumes, and a gasoline smell, and the Taylors are not going to allow themselves, or their children, to sleep on these mattresses, regardless of whether they are cleaned. Also, Marlo simply cannot enter the home at this time, without becoming significantly ill. So, deciding what clothing to move has become quite a hassle for the Taylors.

There are a few items the Taylors have currently chosen to move, and there may be some clothing and other items that Jeremy can gather and they will have cleaned. Some mementos and family heirlooms will also be moved, and possibly cleaned. Per your instruction, we will set up a direct bill for any such expenses. The Taylors however, want to access the home in the future and pick more items to move, and possibly have cleaned. That said, they want to allow Wasatch to do testing, and Lance Hess has informed me that Wasatch wants access to the Taylor's home for vacuum or pneumatic testing. Wasatch can conduct this testing.

The Taylors are hopeful that when Wasatch is finished, they can be allowed to "air" out their home for a week or two by leaving windows open, and hopefully Marlo will then be able to go in and pick the clothing, etc., that she wants to have moved and



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cleaned. Until then, she simply will not risk going into the home, as doing so will likely result in her having to take a trip to the emergency room. We are hopeful that sometime during October or the first part of November the Taylors can "air" out their home and make this inventory.

This highlights an issue I have repeatedly suggested, and that is that the Taylors should be allowed to move all of their belongings out of their home and into some type of permanent storage. While I appreciate your suggestion that the Taylor's home is an adequate place to store these items, the fact is the Taylor's home is contaminated with gasoline fumes, and benzene. Thus, allowing the continued contamination of these household items is really not acceptable. The Taylors have contacted Utah Disaster Cleanup, and they have been told that most cloth furniture exposed to gasoline fumes, even where there is not direct contact, must be replaced. According to Utah Disaster Cleanup some non-clothing furniture items can be cleaned, but doing so will be more difficult if continued exposure to the fumes takes place. Thus, I reiterate our request that Wind River allow the Taylors to move all of the items from their home and store them in a permanent storage facility. I think this request is cost-effective, and reasonable.
